April is Autism Awareness Month

You may have someone in your family with autism or know someone with autism. This month is Autism Awareness Month—but what exactly do we need to be aware of? We need to educate ourselves on the facts regarding autism, not the rumors and criticism of it. It is a fact that I in 54 children are affected with autism and that boys are 4 times more likely to have it. We also need to know the fact that research is ongoing, studies and research are always changing, so we need to stay aware and open to continually educating ourselves and not getting stuck in what we "think" we already know. Autism rates have almost tripled from I in 150 in 2000, to I in 54 today. Is this diagnosis simply the "trend" or is it just that we are getting better at identifying it? Diagnosis isn't just a simple medi- screened. cal test, but a combination of medical diagnoses and records from schools and health care providers. Advances in diagnostic capabilities and better understanding of the disorder are part of the reason for the increase in cases, however, genetic factors and possibly some environmental factors also contribute. The ONE thing research is clear on this the fact that autism has nothing to do with vaccines.

It has been recommended that all one analysis found that 83% of toddlers be screened for autism during routine checkups at their pediatrician. A lot of major pediatricians have universal screening, factors from one or both par-

however it isn't yet happening consistently. And if it does happen, and the pediatrician refers parents to additional testing and services, this follow up is often ignored. As of January 2023, half of kids in the US are being screened.

There is always a possibility of misdiagnosis. As we are learning more and more about other neurological disorders, and often symptoms are similar, we increase the possibility of a misdiagnosis. For example, a doctor might see a child and won't be able to tell if it's ADHD, autism, or a mild intellectual disability. Beyond the improvements in diagnostics, genetic factors could be driving up the cases of autism. the risk of developing autism comes from inherited genetic factors. A child can inherit risk

ents, and older parents carry higher risks. The trend in parents waiting to have children until they are older is a contributing factor.

Environmental factors haven't been proven to be much of a factor for autism, but they can aggravate underlying genetic risks. Studies are currently happening to see if viral infections in children or things like vitamin D deficiency may contribute to the risks of having autism, but there is great work to be done yet. What you can learn from all of this is to stay aware, watch for the facts that emerge from studies, be open-minded, and most of all be compassionate.

Autism is a disorder of levels and layers. There is no one cause and no one fix. Each case is unique. We need to support the children who do have the disorder and their families.



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RESURRECTION JOY

For Christians, the resurrection of Jesus from the dead is a real, historical event. As early as 56 AD, St. Paul in his First Letter to the Corinthians mentioned it. Paul says, "He (Jesus) appeared to Cephas and then to the Twelve."

The angels at the empty tomb were great messengers from heaven to herald Christ's resurrection. The Gospel of John reports that one angel was at the head and another at the foot of the place where Jesus' entombed body had been. Matthew's Gospel gives the curious detail of an angel sitting on top of the large stone that had covered the tomb. The angels said things like "why do you seek the living among the dead?", and "He is not here, for He has been raised, just as He said."

Mary Magdalene and the holy women with her came to anoint Jesus' body on that first Easter Sunday. They were greeted by Jesus, who told them to tell the apostles of His resurrection. Mary Magdalene for this reason is sometimes called the Apostle to the Apostles.

The reading where Peter and the disciple whom lesus loved was always fascinating to me as a child. I had images of the disciple who Jesus loved daring past Peter

Apostles are considered the primary witnesses to the resurrection. But Paul speaks in one of his letters of lesus appearing to more than 500 persons at the same time. This is a key piece of evidence, for if the resurrecone who arrived tion was phony in any way, one of these 500 would have spoken up that lesus had not really appeared.

> The shocking nature of the resurrection led one of the Twelve, Thomas, to not believe the others who had seen lesus risen from the dead. The disciples' faith in Christ was drastically tested during His Passion. The two disciples on the road to Emmaus are described as being sad. This lack of faith among the disciples, ironically, helps build the case for the historical certainty of lesus' resurrection.

> In one post-resurrection appearance, Jesus is reported to have eaten some fish to prove that He was not a ghost. He also cooked breakfast for those who went fishing with Simon Peter. In this latter incident, Our Lord was not instantly recognizable because His risen body shone with the glory of heaven.

Statistics show that over two billion in the world today are believers in Christ Jesus. His resurrection is the crowning truth of the faith that proclaims Jesus as the Savior of the world. God became man in Jesus Christ because He will all men to be save from their sins.

By 1911, organizations that were not church-related began to have a great deal of support. The Odell Band was regularly giving concerts, many of them outdoors, and \$600 was spent on new instruments. The band, numbering 20 in 1911, played at the Steele City Fourth of July celebration. Other musical groups, such as Mrs. Pickett's 18 students, gave recitals and concerts. Although Odell had had a baseball team for several years, a baseball club was organized in 1911 and ground was secured in the Krotz pasture for a ball field. Passed with 4 yea, 0 nay. Jack Moles, Executive Director of the Nebraska Rural Community Schools Association, gave a report to the Board on their membership and recent happenings in the legislature. The Board appreciated Jack's willingness to present to the Board and his dedication to Nebraska schools.

Principal Mezger reported on upcoming assessments, Kindergarten Round-up (April 28), Dr. Seuss Week, as well as other recent student activities.

Motion to approve Senior Sneak Schedule made by Adam Engelman and seconded by Dusty Duis. Motion passed with 4 yea, 0 nay.

Motion to accept the resignation of Jeanne Skidmore from her teaching position effective at the end of the school year made by Kasey Murphy and seconded by Adam Engelman.

Motion passed with 4 yea, 0 nay. Motion to approve teaching contract for Heather Heble for 2023-24 made by Dusty Duis and seconded by Kasey Murphy. Motion passed with 4 yea, 0 nay.

Motion to approve teaching contract for Carson Ebeling for 2023-24 made by Adam Engelman and seconded by Kasey Murphy. Motion passed with 4 yea, 0 nay.

Motion to approve Classified Staff salaries for 2023-24 made by Dusty Duis and seconded by Kasey Engelman.

Motion passed with 4 yea, 0 nay. Superintendent Meyerle reported that there have been issues with cold temperatures int eh link to the new gym. The issue was resolved with added insulation. Casper's Construction took care of the cost. The Board thanks Casper's for their continued

attention and dedication to the new addition and our school.

Superintendent Meyerle reported to the Board that he was moving forward with some cost reductions. The deductions are to counteract LB644 (postcard bill). Superintendent Meyerle and the Board hope that the decrease in spending will allow for the avoidance of the bright pink postcards being mailed out, and would not require participation by the school in the joint county meeting. Valuations and real growth are still a key component and those numbers are unknown until August 20.

Superintendent Meyerle noted his displeasure with the formula that dictates a school's tax request. There is a lot of "real growth" in Lincoln, Grand Island, Kearney, etc., but in rural areas the "real growth" will be limited, which means a school's allowable growth on a tax request will be lower. If a school needs to exceed its allowable amount, then the postcards go out and the school needs to attend the joint meeting.

School Finance is an ongoing question at the state level. We are hoping things change for the better for 2024-25 regarding the state's contribution. At this point with continued increases in staffing salaries, costs of benefits and inflation, Superintendent Meyerle is planning on reducing spending by approximately \$220,000. Reductions are

made up from the following:

- No new bus purchase
- No summer custodial work from the kitchen staff at the elementary
- 25% cut in Hillyard supplies
- No furniture orders
- Reducing one Mental Health position. Will retain one position with the ESU
- Reduce one spot at the Alternative Education School at the ESU
- Possible OT reductions with the ESU
- Tech support from the ESU reduced by .5 days a week (retain 2 days a week)
- Assistant HS Football Coaching position

- Assistant Volleyball Coaching position
- Assistant HS Track Coaching position
- JH Track Coaching position.
- No window/floor/door work
- Eliminate a Small Vehicle Driver
- Reduce one Para position at the elementary to .5 time.

Superintendent Meyerle gave the Board an update on teacher negotiation information. Negotiations will be held int eh fall for the 2024-25 school

He also gave an update on the upcoming MUDECAS All-Star Basketball games that will be held in Odell on March 18. It is the first year for the games. The MUDECAS Association thanks Diode Technologies for their sponsorship and all of the players and coaches for their willingness to participate

Motion to approve bills as presented made by Dusty Duis and seconded by Adam Engelman. Passed with 4 yea, 0 nay.

Motion to adjourn made by Adam Engelman and seconded by Kasey Murphy. Passed with 4 yea, 0 nay. President Kostal adjourned the meeting at 7:54 pm.

The next regular Board meeting is scheduled for April 10, 2023, 7 pm at the Elementary in Diller
