Spring Fever

Lately, we have had pockets of very nice weather. If you are feeling restless for this weather to stick around, if you are feeling "itchy" to be outside, or you are daydreaming a bit more....you may have caught "Spring fever". We have all most likely heard of this term, but is it actually real? There has been a good amount of research done to find out if there are medical diagnoses to spring fever, most being found inconclusive. Doctors are unable to label "spring fever" as a definitive medical category. Some symptoms of spring fever do have scientific explanations (rise in hormones, genetic reactions to having more hours of light in a day, etc.), things such as our "renewal of energy" for no reason except a season change, have been harder to pinpoint an explanation.

Before spring was actually called "spring", it was referred to as "Lent" in Old English. For those who celebrate Easter, you may already be familiar with this term, as it refers to the period leading up to Easter Sunday. During the 14th century, this period known as "Lent" started to be called "springing time", since this was when plants, shrubs, trees, and other greenery started springing back up from the ground. A century later, this term was shortened to "springtime", and a century after that, it was shortened again to what we now call "Spring". (cont'd page 2 & 7)

The Rice Lodge just received some old news articles about Odell's Rice Hospital from the family of David and Darlene Klaus. Most of them we have,

and they are placed in a scrap book at the Rice Lodge or in frames hanging on the wall. This article, however, we have never seen. It is so interesting! It is from the Beatrice newspaper dated Sunday, August 21, 1938. The Rice Hospital would have been 9 years old at that time.

The photo itself is interesting! Notice the awnings. And notice the south side 'porch' which isn't there anymore and hasn't been for many years. Now the Rice Lodge has a wonderful entertainment deck instead, the "Anderson Family Deck".

Also, notice the hand railing at the bottom, left front pace back and forth to their heart's content." of the hospital. There was a dentist's office and laboratory in the northwest corner of the basement in the hospital. Dr. Newell Boughton was the Dentist. The article states that it was "well lighted and ventilated" and that "the temperature seldom goes above 78 to 80 degrees on the hottest days". This railing was there because of steps that went down to the door to the dentist office. From the inside of the basement, you can see right where the door was. This makes me wonder if the steps are still there, under the flower garden.

The article mentions that the hospital was "as fireproof as it can be made. An excellent steam heat-

ing system keeps the building comfortable in winter and its construction makes it many degrees cooler than would be expected on hot summer days". Also, a very ironic statement: there were "ten private rooms, each large, airy, and decorated differently from the others". Ironic because The Rice Lodge, Bed & Breakfast, has 10 bedrooms, each with their own bath and decorated differently from the others!

Mrs. Rice was the "superintendent" of the hospital and a graduated nurse herself. She was assisted by 3 other nurses.

The article states that from 1929 – 1938, "there was an average of 36 babies born a year" in the hospital, although Dr. Rice had many 'home deliveries' also. There was a carpeted hallway "of good length provided for the anxious fathers. Here they may Also, 1929-1938, there was a daily average of 7 patients getting cared for.

Nurse Olga Blanke's "fine home cooking" was a staple for patients.

Spring Fever, cont'd: The "illness" of Spring Fever has been documented by poets for centuries. Even though researchers haven't been unable to put it into a definite medical category, it is a real phenomenon. Matthew Keller of Virginia Institute for Psychiatric and Behavioral Genetics studied 500 people in the US and Canada and found that he more time they spent outside on a sunny day, the better their mood. These moods decreased in the hotter summer months. He found that the optimal temperature for them was 72 degrees (otherwise known as room temperature). Scientifically and historically, sexual behavior in mammals follows a seasonal pattern, one that promotes survival. This "biological clock", is seasonal and is a physical part of Spring Fever. Through the years, researchers have starting studying the opposite side of "Spring Fever", and that has been labeled SAD, or Seasonal Affective Disorder winter depression. They have seen distinct patterns of winter depression lifting in the spring, when the onset of morning light is earlier. It has been shown that there is more depression on the western edges of times zones in the US, where the sun rises later. Although SAD is now officially defined as a medical condition and Spring Fever still alludes the scientists, you made notice particular symptoms in yourself when the spring rolls around.

What are the signs?

- I. Feeling energetic.
- 2. Sleeping less and eating lighter.
- 3. Smiling and feeling happy.
- 4. The desire to get into shape.
- 5. Taking up new hobbies.

- 7. Sensations of claustrophobia.
- 8. Urge to spring clean.

Speaking of Spring cleaning, here is a spring cleaning list with some tips you may or may not have known.

- I. Cleaning your windows: pick a cloudy day because the sun will make the cleaning solution dry too fast and leave streaks. Water and a microfiber cloth have been proven to be the best cleaner, but you can make a cleaner with this recipe: 1/4 cup rubbing alcohol, 1/3 cup vinegar and distilled water. (I also have great luck with really hot water)
- 2. Clean your sliding door tracks (and any odd tracks on windows, etc.) Use an old toothbrush and vacuum to remove dirt. Finish with a wet sponge.
- 3. Clean usually overlooked places: walls, baseboards, and doors. Squirt of Dawn dish soap in a bucket of hot water.
- 4. Deep clean your carpet—hire professionally or rent a machine. You are supposed to deep clean carpets every 12-18 months to retain their warrantee! (oh my!)
- 5. Clean under furniture and appliances.
- 6. Clean light fixtures: Do this first, so the dust that falls. doesn't fall on clean floors and carpets.
- 7. Perform safety checks around your home: check smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector batteries. Make sure you have a fire extinguisher.

- 6. Scatterbrained and unfocused. 8. Power wash your exterior this prevents mold and mildew building up.
 - 9. Clean and repair gutters
 - 10. Rotate and flip mattress
 - 11. Clean mattress pads, blankets, bedspreads.
 - 12. Clean your pillows
 - 13. Go through cabinets and get rid of old and expired products and products that you haven't used in a year.
 - 14. Cut tags off all pillows, area rugs, and throw rugs. This helps your home look more comfortable, and makes things easier when cleaning.
 - 15. Find a place in a cabinet for trash cans. This eliminates a cluttered look.
 - 16. Find a place in a cabinet to store your toilet brush, plungers, etc. This helps eliminate a cluttered look.

now is a national celebration. During Women's History Month, we celebrate the courageous women who have helped our Nation build a fairer, more just society. Throughout history, the vision and achievements of powerful women have strengthened our Nation and opened the doors of opportunity wider for us. Many of their stories go untold, but our country has been built upon their shoulders. Despite the progress that these visionaries achieved, there is much more work ahead to knock down the barriers of seeing women and girls reach their FULL potential. Below is a timeline of notable events for women in the US:

-March 31, 1776: Abigail Adams makes a plea to her husband John Adams and the Continental Congress to "Remember the ladies and be more generous and favorable to them than your ancestors. Do not put such limited power into the hands of the husbands. Remember, all men would be tyrants if they could. If particular care and attention nis not paid to the ladies, we are determined to foment a rebellion, and will not hold ourselves bound by any laws in which we have no voice or representation." January 23, 1849: Elizabeth Blackwell becomes first woman to graduate from medical school and become a doctor in US.

—May 28, 1851: New Yorker, Sojourner Truth delivers her speech at the Women's Rights Convention in Akron Ohio. "And ain't I a woman? Look at me! Look at my arm! I have plowed and planted, and gathered into barns, and no such man could head me! I have borne 13 children, and seen most all sold off to slavery, and when I cried out with my mother's grief, but no one but Jesus heard me!"

—Dec. 10, 1869: Wyoming becomes the first state to allow women to

—Jan. 22, 1973: US Supreme Court (Roe vs Wade) declares that the Constitution protects a women's right to an abortion.

—Sep 20, 1973: Billie Jean King beats Bobby Riggs in straight sets.

—July 7, 1981: Sandra Day O'Connor is sworn in as the first women on US Supreme Court.

—June 18, 1983: Sally Ride becomes first American women in space.

—Sep. 13, 1994: President Clinton signs the Violence against Women Act.

—Jan 4, 2007: Nancy Pelosi becomes the first female speaker of the house.

—Jan 24, 2013: The US military removes a ban against women serving in combat positions.

—July 26, 2016: Hillary Clinton becomes the first woman to receive a presidential nomination.

—January 20, 2021: Kamala Harris is sworn in as the first woman vice president of the US.

Within Women's History Month, sits March 8. March 8 has been declared International Women's Day, where we look at, not just women in American, but over the whole globe. All around the world, women share the same rights. Why is important for women to have equal rights and be protected? In 2023 the Women, Peace and Security (WPS) Index found that women's well-being is DIRECTLY linked with the well being

of a country. The more equally women are treated, the more secure they feel, the better a country will do. Countries where women are doing well scored higher in terms of peace, democracy, and prosperity. In fact, these impacts are more strongly correlated with women's status than with the Gross Domestic Product (GDP).

The lowest ranking countries are always countries who are experiencing armed conflict. (Afghanistan is the lowest ranking). Denmark and Iceland continue to rank in the top 2 positions, having a fully gender equitable legal system and give women full access to justice. The US ranks 43rd (as of 2023), a drop from 27th in 2022. This is being attributed to community safety and political unrest. We rank similarly to Slovenia, Bulgaria, and Taiwan. Elena Ortiz, the research manager for Georgetown's Women's Peace and Security states that "countries where women are doing well are more prosperous, peaceful, democratic, and better prepared to respond to the impacts of climate change. When women are doing well, everyone in society is doing well."

The right to live a life free from violence and slavery; the right to be educated; the right to earn a fair and equal wage; the right to own property; the right to expression and freedom to vote. These are human rights, and human rights are inherent to all—without discrimination. Empowering women fuels thriving economies, spurring productivity and growth.

If you harbor any feelings of women being "lesser", you need to put those feelings aside and step up to the plate. We have so many women who have worked so hard, for so many years, for equality. It's time for all men to do the same. There is no room for male chauvinism in our society.

Motion to approve minutes of last meeting made by Adam Engelman seconded by Kolin Kotas. Passed with 6 yea, 0 nay. No Student Report.

Principal Mezger was not at the meeting, but provided a written report to the Board. Principal Mezger will be purchasing new athletic records boards that will be mounted in the link to the gym this summer.

The Board had questions about summer weight training that Superintendent Meyerle noted he would defer to Principal Mezger and the head coaches. The Board does prefer the HS teams to lift together at the HS site, while utilizing the fitness center in Diller for JH students which the proximity woks for. Superintendent Meyerle reported that he planned to purchase a 2024 Diesel International bus and trade the 2015 bus. The 2024 will be come a sub bus/activity bus and the 2020 bus will become a route bus.

Motion to approve teaching contract for Hunter Cerveny made by Kolin Kotas and seconded by Adam Engelman. Motion passed with 6 yea, 0 nay. The Board welcomes Mr. Cerveny to Diller-Odell Public Schools. Mr. Cerveny will be teaching 6th grade and be an Assistant Football

Motion to approve classified wages for 2024-2025 made by Dusty Duis and seconded by Kasey Murphy. Motion passed with 6 yea, 0 nay. Superintendent Meyerle made his recommendations. All classified staff will receive at least a 3% raise. There was no discussion.

Superintendent Meyerle is planning on updating the trophy cases at the high school near the old gym and adding some new ones in the halls as you walk toward

the new gym.

Superintendent Meyerle reported on the financial status of the school district, and feels the district is in a secure position. Unless there are unexpected changes in school finance law, he plans on being able to lower the district's tax

request again in the fall.

The Board is planning on those renovations in the summer of 2025.

The Board appreciates the relationship with the Nebraska Association of School Boards and the service they provide Motion to adjourn made by Adam Engelman and seconded by Kolin Kotas. 

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
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
