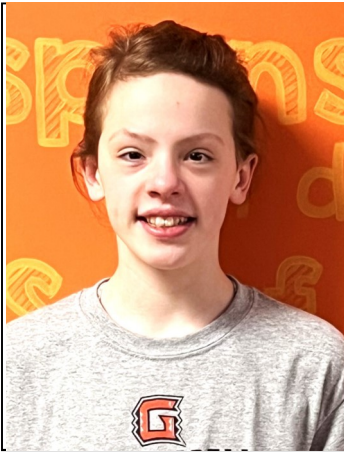

Regular Board Meeting—7:00 pm

Present: Adam Engelman, Angie Clifford, Dusty Duis & Kasey Murphy. Absences of Paul Kostal & Kolin Kotas excused.

Motion to approve minutes of last meeting made by Angie Clifford seconded by Dusty Duis Passed with 4 yea, 0 nay.

Due to speech night, No Student Report.

The Diller Foundation Youth Survey Results presentation was rescheduled for the April Board meeting.

Principal Mezger reported to the Board on Spring activities.

Motion to approve Senior Sneak Schedule made by Kasey Murphy and seconded by Dusty Duis. Passed with 4 yea, 0

nay.

Motion to approve resignation of Jacki Tegtmeier from her teaching position effective at the end of the school year made by Angie Clifford and seconded by Kasey Murphy. Motion passed with 4 yea, 0 nay. The Board thanked Mrs. Jacki Tegtmeier for her nine years of service to the School District, and wished her well.

Motion to approve Principal contract for Dylan Hinrichs 2024-2025 made by Adam Engelman and seconded by Kasey Mur-

phy. Motion passed with 4 yea, 0 nay. The Board set the administrative contract for Mr. Hinrichs at 195 days with a salary of \$85,000. Mr. Hinrichs will be the full time Principal at the elementary beginning August 2024.

Motion to approve administrative salaries for 2024-2025 made by Dusty Duis and seconded by Angie Clifford. Motion passed with 4 yea, 0 nay. The Board set superintendent Meyerle's administrative contract at \$164,000 for 2024-2025 and Principal Mezger's administrative contract at \$118,000 for 2024-2025.

The Board reviewed extra duty recommendations. Superintendent Meyerle noted that with Mrs. Tegtmeier moving to the ESU and working with the districts 18021 year olds at SCC, he did not plan on filling the position at the HS.

Motion to approve bills as presented made by Angie Clifford and seconded by Kasey Murphy. Motion passed with 4 yea and 0 nay.

Some Board members will be attending the annual NRCSA Conference this week.

Motion to adjourn made by Kasey Murphy and seconded by Angie Clifford Passed with 4 yea, 0 nay.

Vice President Engelman adjourned the meeting at 7:33 pm. The next regular meeting is scheduled for April 8, 2024 at Elementary.

APRIL IS AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH—MYTHS OF AUTISM

Myth #1: Autistic people are mentally ill.

People with autism are twice more likely to suffer from a mental health disorder especially when they are not diagnosed early and given proper intervention. However, having autism does not make someone “mentally ill.” Instead, autism affects the brain structure since it is categorized as a neurological disorder.

Myth #2: Autism is only for children.

Autism spectrum disorder affects all kinds of people no matter their race or age or socioeconomic status. On the other hand, autism is more commonly diagnosed in children especially when they show obvious symptoms of the disorder. Children with autism can grow up and become teens or even adults who are left undiagnosed unless someone professional or those familiar with autism can point out obvious signs of the disorder.

Myth #3: Children with autism can grow out of it.

Children with autism cannot outgrow the disorder since it’s not a phase or a stage. In fact, autism is a lifelong disorder. The only way someone with autism can manage their symptoms is through specific treatments like applied behavior therapy. Proper diet and exercise also play a role in managing autism. Since autism is a spectrum disorder, every individual’s needs are also unique and different.

Myth #4: Children or people with autism are very smart (or not).

Autism signs and symptoms vary from person to person. Some children with autism exhibit language delays. Others are totally nonverbal. Some have difficulty interacting with their peers. Some individuals diagnosed with autism manage to function highly and live independently without requiring much support. Simultaneously, certain individuals demonstrate superior intelligence levels, notwithstanding their ASD diagnosis.

Myth #5: People with autism are violent and dangerous.

Most of the time, people or children with autism tend to be violent due to outside stressors that causes emotional distress. Sometimes, these violent tendencies are shown in the form of “tantrums” or other aggressive acts. In some cases, some people with autism resort to self-harm like banging their heads or biting their arms. Usually, an overload of outside sensory stimuli causes people with autism to suffer from emotional distress. The sensory overload they ex-

perience cause someone with autism to lash out or react violently. When this happens, proper intervention is very important to help the autistic child calm down in a stressful environment and situation. Here, the parent’s or guardian’s support and care play a crucial role in making the autistic child or person feel loved and secure.

Myth #6: People with autism cannot form relationships.

One of the most common misconceptions among people with autism is that they don’t want to form relationships with others. The truth is, people with autism actually want to form relationships with their peers and family. The only problem is that social interactions are a big challenge for them since people on the spectrum have difficulty understanding social cues. This doesn’t mean that they don’t want to form any kind of relationship with other people. This is where offering emotional support, guidance, and understanding them on a different level can make a lot of difference for those on the spectrum.

Myth #7: Vaccines cause autism.

Previously, many believed that the vaccine component known as thimerosal was a primary cause for autism spectrum disorder (ASD). This theory sparked much controversy and led to its eventual removal from vaccines. Interestingly enough, rather than seeing a reduction in ASD cases sans thimerosal, the number of autism spectrum disorder diagnoses worldwide increased significantly. This unexpected outcome debunked the notion that vaccines are a cause of autism.

Myth #8: There is a cure for autism.

Unfortunately, autism has no known cure. At the moment, people with autism manage their symptoms with the help of therapy and other similar treatment options. Since autism is a lifelong disorder, natal screening and evaluation are very important to provide early diagnosis and intervention.

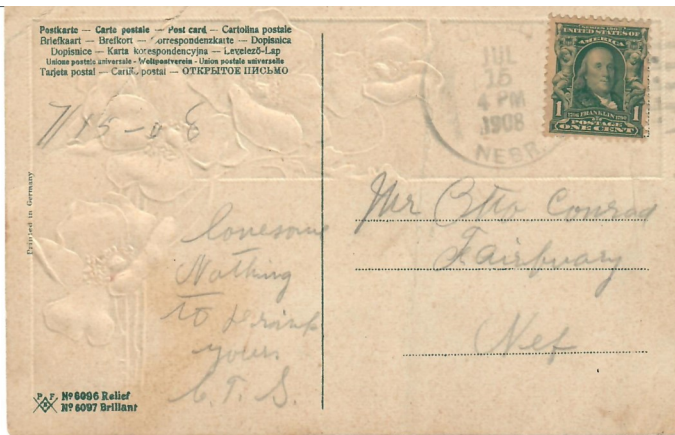

Basic Instructions Before Leaving Earth

April 2024

As a priest, I proclaim to my people, Sunday after Sunday, almost the entirety of the New Testament. This happens over the span of three years. We read abundant portions of the Old Testament too. The Psalms are a bedrock every Sunday, and many of the prophetic books are read.

In Sacred Scripture, God speaks to man in a human way, a way that we can understand. The human authors, all the way from Moses to Matthew, were each writing to affirm some truth which God wanted them to reveal by their words.

The sacred authors wrote in different times and cultures. They were also affected by literary genres in use at the time as well as the modes of feeling, speaking, and narrating. Prophetic and poetic styles, as well as Gospel narratives, express the truth in various ways.

Sacred Scripture is inspired by God the Holy Spirit. To interpret the differing authors, the Scriptures must be read and interpreted in the light of this same Holy Spirit.

All of the Scriptures, Old and New Testaments, are unified in God's plan of salvation through Christ Jesus. The Old Testament points

to all that Christ said and did, while the New Testament fulfills all of the prophecies which had been proclaimed about the Lord.

It has been said that the Sacred Scripture is written principally in the Church's heart rather than in documents and records. The Holy Spirit gives the Church the spiritual interpretation of the Scriptures.

When reading the Scriptures, the analogy of faith is interwoven throughout its pages. This analogy means that the coherence of the truths of faith are united among themselves and within the whole plan of Revelation. In other words, the faith expressed in one part of the Bible cannot be contradicted by anything found in another part.

I enjoyed the Bible when I was a child. But now I can say that I love the Sacred Scriptures. The Sacred Word of God is received by each generation and then handed down to the next. You could say that the books of the Bible bring forth salvation in Christ to all generations. The catchy acronym given to the word “bible” is proven true again and again: Basic Instructions Before Leaving Earth.
