An Easter Meditation

The holy women who went to Jesus' tomb early on the morning of the first Easter thought they would find a body to anoint; instead they found an empty tomb. For this reason, the Gospel tells us, the women "were seized with trembling and amazement" (Mark 16:8). They saw the great stone before the tomb rolled away and inside a young man in a white robe. Imagine hearing the words of the angel: "Do not be afraid! You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen". And then this important message: "He is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him". What does this mean, that he will go to Galilee and wants the disciples to meet them there?

For the disciples, going to Galilee meant that Jesus was giving them new lives. They saw it as going back to the place where the Lord first called them to follow him. Beginning in Galilee, they had followed Jesus. Yet, even though they were close followers, they frequently had misunderstood his words. In the face of the cross they had abandoned him and fled. Even so, the Risen Lord gives the message that he will go ahead of them to Galilee. It is as if Jesus says to them: "Let us start over from where we began. Let us begin anew. I want you to be with me again, in spite of everything". We are each called to go to


Galilee with the risen Lord. Easter teaches us that it is always possible to begin anew. In spite of our past, God can create the work of art which he has always intended us to be. The Risen Lord is asking his disciples now—us—to go to Galilee. Our Galilee is our daily lives, the country roads and highways we travel every day.

Why does the angel say that the risen Jesus will meet with his disciples in Galilee; why not Jerusalem or Bethlehem? Because Galilee is where Jesus began his mission; he was first and foremost called Jesus of Nazareth. In Galilee, he first brought his message to the excluded ones, to those whom the world looked down upon. Our own Galilee is our normal everyday life. Here, Jesus makes himself present in the lives of those who share our day, those at home and at work, in our neighbors down the road or across the street. In Galilee we learn to find the Risen One in the faces of all of our brothers and sisters, in our closest loved ones, in strangers, and in those who we find to be unlikable.

The Lord loves, this we know. He also likes us, a lot. And he wants us to go to Galilee to be with him so that we can be with him forever in heaven.



<u>Diller-Odell Board of Education</u> High School Media Center-Odell May 13, 2024

Regular Board Meeting-7:00 pm

Present: Paul Kostal, Adam Engelman, Dusty Duis, Stuart Vitosh, Angie Clifford & Kasey Murphy. Stuart Vitosh was recorded as in attendance after his being appointed to the Board. Motion to approve minutes of last meeting made by Adam

Engelman seconded by Dusty Duis. Passed with 5 yea, 0 nay. Declare a vacancy on the Board of Education due to the death of an incumbent; discuss, consider and take all necessary action to appoint a replacement member of the board to fill unexpired term of the vacant position. Motion to appoint Stuart Vitosh to the vacant Board seat made by Angie Clifford and seconded by Kasey Murphy. Motion passed with 5 yea, 0 nay. The Board welcomed Stuart Vitosh to the Board and thanked him for his willingness to accept the appointment. No student report.

Principal Mezger reported on the 2024-2025 class schedule, assessments, awards ceremonies, graduation, and plans for the fall of 2024.

Motion to approve the purchase of micro bus made by Angie Clifford and seconded by Adam Engelman. Motion passed with 6 yea, 0 nay. Superintendent Meyerle has a 14 passenger micro van on order. It will arrive by September or October. This purchased was needed due to the NDE regulation of not allowing student use in 12 passenger vans. Superintendent Meyerle traded the two 12 passenger vans. Schools cannot legally remove seats in large vans to limit the capacity to solve the issue. The issue is the size of the vans. Superintendent Meyerle had traded for a Pacifica that meets the needed seating specifications.

There are a number of staff that will attend the needed Level I training to be able to drive the I4 passenger micro bus. No CDL is required to drive a micro bus. This will be very helpful with activities.

Motion to approve the use of Wilken's Architects for design of possible elementary entrance remodel for safety and security made by Kasey Murphy and seconded by Adam Engelman. Motion passed with 6 yea, 0 nay. The approval of Wilken's Architects is to design the remodel of the elementary entry and office area for improved safety and security. This renovation has been suggested through the annual safety audit. Once Wilkens creates the design the plans will be put out for hids

Wilkens creates the design, the plans will be put out for bids. Superintendent Meyerle reported that the school had been awarded \$75,000 from the state of Nebraska to be used for

the upgrade. Superintendent Meyerle said the school was fortunate as it was a competitive grant and many schools received \$2000.

Some Board members and administration will meet with the Wilken's staff in June on the remodel plan. The remodel, if approved, would take place in the summer of 2025. The grant money awarded must be used for this specific remodel, and not another project.

Superintendent Meyerle reported that John Denner will resign as a full time bus driver at the end of the school year. He remains as a teacher and is willing to sub drive some routes. Kristie Sutton will resign as a para at the end of the school year. She will become a full-time driver of a micro bus route next fall.

Principal Mezger provided a written report for the Technology update.

Superintendent Meyerle noted that work was scheduled on the track for resurfacing this summer as well as some renovation to the shop floor with flake flooring.

Motion to accept milk bid from Hiland Dairy as part of the Southeastern Milk Cooperative made by Angie Clifford and seconded by Adam Engelman. Motion passed with 6 yea, 0 nay.

The Board discussed a school operated day care. After speaking to our legal counsel and schools that have such programs, there would be a great deal of concern about having a school-run day care program.

The Administration discussed legislative changes that would allow for some 5-year-old attendance in preschool. The school is waiting for policy options from KSB School Law on the issue. Superintendent Meyerle noted that if the program was full of 4-year-olds, there would never be space for 5-year-olds in the program in there are spots available. We hope to have the policy options in June.

Superintendent Meyerle noted that some school budget items are up in the air due to the possible Special Legislative session that may be called.

Motion to approve bills as presented made by Kasey Murphy and seconded by Adam Engelman. Motion passed with 6 yea, 0 pay

Motion to adjourn made by Angie Clifford and seconded by Stuart Vitosh. Passed with 6 yea, 0 nay.

President Kostal adjourned the meeting at 8:02 pm. The next regular meeting is scheduled for June 11 2024, 7 pm, at Elementary.

As we continue our journey into intentional homesteading and mindful living, I am thrilled to share the progress of my first garden. This month has been a rewarding experience as I picked out and planted my first vegetables. We have a full summer calendar of schoolrelated camps and activities, along with club sports activities. Looking at it can be a bit overwhelming, but the minute that we've made it through, I'm left wondering why I secondguessed at all. This busy schedule helps me approach the busyness of life with a different mindset, embracing each moment as an opportunity for growth and connection.

As I watch my children navigate these new roles, I am reminded of the importance of fostering independence and resilience. Just as our plants need the right conditions to thrive, so too do our teenagers require guidance and support as they grow into responsible adults. By providing them with opportunities to contribute to the household and encouraging their first steps into the working world, we help them build a strong foundation for their future.

The journey of homesteading and intentional living is filled with moments of reflection and growth. As we nurture our gardens and our children, we are reminded of the profound connections between tending to the earth and cultivating a life of purpose and meaning.

In the coming summer months, I look forward to sharing more updates on our garden's progress and the lessons we learn along the way. Together, let us continue to embrace the joys and challenges of homesteading, finding beauty in

> each small victory and exploring new, conventional ways to enrich our homesteading experience.


