Odell Day:

Comments from people: Kelly mentioned she had a handful of people mention a date change (back to later in the year).

Small Businesses: Thank you to the Odell Market for providing lunch options, grilling, and staying open late. Sunny's was busy and offered some sandwich specials. Thanks to The Corner for hosting the band.

Sand Volleyball: Had 8 Teams (Maximum). The HS Volleyball Team helped.

Free Throw Contest: good amount of participants **3 on 3 BBall tourney** only had 4 youth teams, but they had a good time.

Recycling Tips

It's been awhile since I have done a recycling update. Recycling can be confusing and seem overwhelming, so you may just say "it's not worth it". OR you may hear rumors like "they just take it to the dump anyway, so I am not wasting my time". Before you give up or believe the rumors you hear, stop and educate yourself and learn the SIMPLE facts.

- CLEAN recycling only. It's a VERY simple habit to adapt. Wash or rinse the container, can, or bottle out. QUICK AND EASY! Make it a routine and you won't think twice about it. Once it's clean and dry (just like your dishes!), it is ready to head to recycling.
- 2. IF you are out in a public space, the CLEAN tip is in effect. Someone has to deal with the dirty item you may throw in the recycling. IF you don't have access to a nearby sink, then take it home with you. Again, NOT HARD, just a habit to get into. IF you have access to a sink, DUMP out the drink and quickly rinse it out. IF you have a bottle of milk or chocolate milk, it needs to be rinsed out, otherwise it just rots inside the container. LOOK for recycling around you—BE AWARE!
- 3. IF food waste gets on a group of recycling because you didn't clean it or threw a partially full drink bottle in the recycling, then it CAN NOT be recycled and has to be taken to the landfill. So, if you have heard something about recycling being taken to a landfill, then it may just be your fault.
- 4. **Odell recycling** takes CLEAN plastic, TIN cans, newspapers, regular paper, and magazines.
- ALUMINUM is NOT TIN. Aluminum cans can be taken to local businesses and sold for money back. ALUMNIMUM is a VERY recyclable product. Anytime you can use an aluminum can instead of a plastic bottle, you are WAY ahead of the game.
- If you have glass to recycle, do your research. Lincoln has many recycling locations that take glass.
 (AGAIN make sure it is clean)
- You do NOT need to remove labels from cans and containers before recycling, HOWEVER if you can get them off easily, then it does improve the quality of the recycling.
- 8. Caps can be left with plastic bottles when recycling.
- 9. Most plastic recycling is for #1 and #2. If you toss other items in with this, such as plastic grocery sacks, you are either giving the workers more work, or actually destroying that batch of recycling. This means don't toss your recycling in while it is in a garbage or grocery bag.
- 10. FLEXIBLE plastic is items such as grocery bags, wrap around products like drink bottles, pop can rings, etc. There is a lot of FLEXIBLE plastic in our

- world. This plastic needs to be recycled at a location that accepts it—such as Walmart. IF you read their signs on their Bag Recycling receptacles, you will see these items listed.
- II. Printer Cartridges can be taken to Office Depot or Office Max to be recycled. They even reward you with points that can go toward purchases within their stores.
- 12. **Batteries** can be recycled at appropriate locations. Batteries are a huge problem in our world as they can contain dangerous chemicals if just tossed into the trash. They can even be a fire hazard in your trash. Batteries can be recycled in Lincoln at locations such as Ace Hardware, Home Depot, & Lowe's—however don't just toss all your batteries in—some of these locations ONLY recycling rechargeable batteries.

 American Recycling in Lincoln is a location that recycles almost anything, so check here for batteries. Your ultimate goal would be to switch to rechargeable batteries exclusively. They are an investment initially, but will end up saving you money in the end and you are tossing them into the earth. Car batteries are typically recycled at a automotive store.
- Electronics are recycled at different locations in Lincoln. Search online, but start with American Recycling.
- 14. Cardboard is an easy item to recycle. Many big cities won't even accept in with your trash anymore. Take yours to Beatrice Recycling in (located in the old human society location). FLATTEN your cardboard. This is a very simple and easy thing to do. Every time you get a box, break it down and flatten it—it literally takes 30 seconds.
- 15. Hard to recycle items such as Cleaning Products, Paint, Mattresses, Tires, and Lightbulbs, generally can't be recycled often. CHECK with your local Recycling Organization (Keep Beatrice Beautiful) for different dates they accept and recycle these items.
- 16. STYROFOAM CAN'T be recycled, so stop using it. It is one of the worst things you can use. Yes, I know it keeps things hot and cold, but we live in a pretty easy world as it is, this is something you can sacrifice for the earth.
- 17. **Clothing and Textiles** generally can't be recycled, so donating them is your best bet so they can at least be reused. (cont'd on next page)

RECYCLING THINGS TO REMEMBER

- 1. Although Recycling is excellent, we all have heard the 3 Rs—REDUCE, REUSE, and RECY-CLE. Look at that closely...recycle is the last on the list...this means, start with the first-REDUCE. This is key—get back to not living in a disposable way. Stop eating off plastic and paper and tossing. Start using reusable products like water bottles, etc.. Get back to washing dishes and reusing things. FOCUS on RE-DUCING and REUSING....Recycling should be a LAST resort. Plastic Companies have brainwashed us into thinking because we are recycling we are doing the best we can...but in the end it just makes us buy more plastic—which they benefit from. STOP using so much. Plastic is killing the earth, our water, our bodies. It is so, so bad for us.
- 2. Recycling is NOT hard or confusing if you stop telling yourself that. It takes way more time for you to scroll through social media on your phone than it does to work recycling into your life. It takes way less time to wash your dishes than it does to load up your trash and take it to the curb because you have made so much.

- 3. Reducing is not hard either. Any disposable items you are using that have a better option (such as fabric napkins) make the shift. IT SAVES YOU MONEY TOO! Bonus.
- 4. Stop living a "throw it away and forget it life".
- 5. **Stop using rumors** you hear as excuses to not do what is right.
- 6. Local recycling companies are actually working VERY hard to recycle. They don't just load it up and take it to the landfill, believe me. IF they have to do this occasionally, then it is because someone threw food in with the recycling or the cardboard recycling got wet and couldn't be recycled.
- 7. Yet again, in this world of negatively, we need to be reminded to believe the good and don't' get sucked into rumors and negativity.
- 8. Instead of spending your time talking about the "people" who promote these ideas and implement them...instead of spending your time laughing about them—Support them.

If you have questions about bus routes, please contact the office at 402-766-4210 and we will put you in touch with the driver. All of the buses do converge at the elementary school in the morning and the afternoon. If you are new to our district, below is a brief description of where our buses run.

- Marlene Wolken-North of Diller and to the Northwest (Harbine) part of the district.
- Kristie Sutton-South of Diller, along Highway 8 toward Odell, and the southwest (Steele City) part of the district.
- Brian Vitosh/Cindy Stohs-The central part of the district, and east of Odell
- George Rempel- The central part of the district north of Diller and Odell (Ellis), and the northeast part of the district.

TIPS FOR PARENTS TO PREP KIDS FOR SCHOOL:

- I. Discuss their new classroom and teacher. Let them know it is OK to be nervous and they aren't alone. ONLY positive talk about their teachers, other students, administration, and school in general. If you talk negative about these at home, they will carry that with them and it will affect them. This includes any coaches they have for extracurricular activities.
- 2. Prioritize the basics: Sleep, exercise, & nutrition. Get in a consistent and healthy sleep pattern before school starts. Remind kids to eat a filling breakfast and lunch as this will help them through the day. Get them outside to walk, bike, or play so their bodies are ready physically for their days at school
- 3. Make sure they are up to date on immunizations and doctor appointments (eye, dentist, etc.)
- 4. Stay aware of their mental state. Kids are dealing with a lot more mentally these days, so be diligent in educating yourself and being aware.
- 5. Discuss and remind them about racism, bullying, and kindness.
- Discuss Bus Safety, how to walk/bike to school safety. Don't assume your child has good pedestrian skills.
- Plan for mindful media use—give them limits and a routine now so they will be prepared for school and homework.
- 8. Remember your summer routine may harm your child's productiveness at school. It is up to you to send your child to school ready and prepared to do their best. This is not the teacher's job. If all kids come into the classroom prepared, it gives their teacher the opportunity to teach and not spend time with other issues. This only benefits your child and the other students.

JH/HS Tech Info and Resources

Students will receive district devices the first day of school along with the associated paperwork. This paperwork will guide students and parents to view the technology documents located in this news article. The paperwork will need to be signed by students and parents and returned by Thursday, August 22nd. Also, if parents choose to allow students to take the devices home each day, a \$40 technology fee will need be submitted by Thursday August 22nd.

During the first few days of school, students will hear a presentation by our school attorney, Bobby Truhe.

Starting the HPV vaccination series at age 9 is recommended by the American Cancer Society, American Academy of Pediatrics, and the National HPV Vaccination Roundtable (HPVRT), which includes leading thought experts from clinical, public health, and academic research institutions. Previous guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices recommends routine HPV vaccination at age 11 or 12 years but notes that HPV vaccination can be given starting at age 9 years old. There are many benefits to initiating the HPV vaccine series at age 9. These include: I. Offers more time for completion of the series by age 13 2. Results in a strong immune response to the HPV vaccine 3. Increases the likelihood of vaccinating prior to first HPV exposure 4. Decreases questions about sexual activity by parents and guardians 5. Decreases requests for only vaccines that are "required" for school 6. Decreases the number of administered shots per visit 7. Increases vaccinations and
